pertussis reported in over 60 years, resulting in at least 10 infant deaths and hundreds more that have required hospitalization. Pertussis is a highly contagious bacterial illness spread by coughs and sneezes. People sick at any age with pertussis have severe coughing attacks that can last for months. Infants are most vulnerable to pertussis, catching it from siblings, parents and other close contacts.



A new school vaccine requirement, recently signed into law, is an important step in stopping the spread of pertussis in California. Vaccination is the best defense from pertussis; however, the immunity from both pertussis disease and vaccines wears off over time, necessitating booster immunization for adolescents and adults.

Beginning July 1, 2011, all students entering 7th through 12th grades will need proof of a pertussis (Tdap) booster shot before starting the 2011-2012 school year. On July 1, 2012 and annually thereafter, students entering the 7th grade will need proof of a Tdap booster before starting school. The new Tdap requirement applies to all public and private schools. The requirement does not affect students enrolled in summer school.

In response to the recent pertussis outbreak, in July, 2010, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) released broader recommendations for immunization. In summary:

1. CDPH strongly recommends a Tdap booster shot for all adolescents and adults who have not yet received a documented dose, regardless of when they received their last Td booster*. In addition, children 7 through 9 years of age who did not receive the full DTaP vaccine series when they were younger and are in need of additional doses of vaccine, should receive one dose of Tdap.
2. Immunization with Tdap is especially important for:
Women of childbearing age - preferably before pregnancy, else during or immediately after pregnancy;
Other close contacts (family members and caregivers) of infants, including those older than 64 years of age*;
Health Care Workers, particularly those who have direct contact with infants and pregnant women;
Patients 7 years and older with wounds should receive Tdap instead of Td or TT when immunization is indicated to prevent tetanus.
3. CDPH strongly recommends that all infants receive their recommended doses of DTaP on time. The first dose has been typically given at 2 months of age but may be given as early as 6 weeks to begin protecting infants sooner. Children 7-9 years of age who did not receive all of their routine childhood DTaP vaccine doses are recommended to receive Tdap to help protect them against pertussis*.

The recommendation by CDPH for a dose of Tdap for all youth ages 10 years and older will fulfill the new school entry requirement. While not routine, a dose of Tdap given between the 7th and 10th birthday will also meet the school entry requirement, but the students may not be fully protected through the end of high school. Adolescents who have received only the Td booster vaccine will have not met the new pertussis immunization requirement.

Vaccinating youth now helps protect them against the ongoing threat of pertussis, meet the new school requirement, and reduce the last-minute rush: more than a million middle, junior, and high school students will

need a Tdap vaccine before the 2011-2012 school year starts. Starting now, recall all your preteen and teen patients who haven't yet received Tdap. This is also a good time to check whether your adolescent patients are up-to-date with other recommended vaccines: meningococcal conjugate, HPV, influenza and a 2nd varicella booster.

Finally, health care providers are reminded that vaccine products have similar names and abbreviations which can be confusing to school staff, who will be keeping records for the new law. Be sure to document immunizations clearly and accurately. Schools report that immunization records are not always clear whether the student received Tdap, which meets the new requirement, and Td, which does not. Make sure the patient's Tdap immunization record clearly states that Tdap was given.

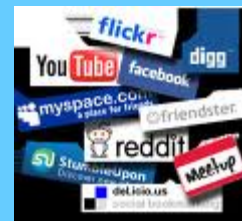

New ACIP Provisional Recommendations

During their October meeting, ACIP adopted several new provisional recommendations. Based on studies and epidemiological data the ACIP has expanded Tdap immunization recommendations to include:

- The minimum interval between Td and Tdap vaccination was removed
- Seniors > 65 years with infant contact should receive a Tdap vaccine
- ACIP made a permissive recommendation of Tdap for seniors >65 years
- Children 7-10 years who were under-immunized with DTaP should receive a Tdap
- Tdap during pregnancy was not addressed



ACIP also made two new Meningococcal recommendations. These are based on several antibody studies that show Meningococcal vaccine has waning immunity within 5 years of administration and that immunocompromised individuals need a 2 dose primary series to obtain adequate protection.

- Administration of a 2nd dose of Meningococcal vaccine at age 16 years
- 2-dose primary series for HIV-infected, complement deficient or asplenic individuals

These recommendations constitute an off label use of vaccines but will be covered by the Vaccine Compensation Fund. Once the recommendations are finalized and published in the MMWR, the VFC program will provide vaccines for these recommendations. Private insurance is required by law to cover these recommendations; following the recommendations publication in MMWR, insurance companies

should incorporate coverage in new plan agreements with physicians.

"Is Your Child Fully Protected?"

We all know that it takes a strong partnership of Coalition members to positively impact immunization rates in a community. The Immunization Partnership of Alameda County (IPAC) made the most out of their November general membership meeting by turning that gathering into a social exchange and work event. Using industry provided postage paid reminder cards Coalition members coordinated a large mailing of immunization reminder cards to families of young children in their community. The cards, with the caption, "Is Your Child Fully Protected?" were made available in English and Spanish.



The IPAC Steering Committee selected a specific age range and timed the mailing for maximum impact. They decided that a mailing during flu season would be most relevant to families who may have missed routine vaccinations as well as those needing seasonal flu vaccine. The age range selected was 19 to 36 months. The Alameda Alliance was an integral component of the work group and was able to query their membership lists to print mailing labels for families of selected providers. By providing lunch as well as a very exciting agenda they recruited almost 40 members to this meeting and planned to get at least 4000 cards ready for mailing. The hard work of the Immunization Partnership of Alameda County is a great example of how to get Coalition members directly involved in making great things happen in their community.

Preteen Vaccine Week: February 13-19, 2011



In light of California's new law requiring a Tdap booster for all students between 7th and 12th grades, Preteen Vaccine Week 2011 is a great opportunity to remind parents, providers, schools and community

partners. Preteen Vaccine Week (PVW) is a California observance created to draw attention to the importance of immunizations for children 11- and 12-years old. IPAC Takes ISI on the Road!

The Immunization Partnership of Alameda County (IPAC) works with both the Alameda County Public Health Immunization Project and the City of Berkeley Immunization Program. IPAC counts community based clinics, hospitals, schools, Head Start, CHDP, the local Medi-Cal Managed Care program and public health nursing among its members.

For the past two summers, IPAC has offered Immunization Skills Institutes (ISI), a CDPH-designed curriculum for Medical Assistants. The training emphasizes vaccine management and administration. Summer was chosen as the best time to offer the training--it's the "down time" before back-to-school and the flu craziness.

Alameda County has a population of 1.5 million spread over 813 square miles. The county's size poses an enormous challenge for anyone who need to reach a centralized training venue. To make the training more accessible, we offered four ISIs--in the south, central and northern parts of the County--over a three-week period. We held them at local hospitals and public health buildings. Three of the sessions were held in the evening, and the fourth was scheduled during the daytime at the request of the participants. We also provided light meals, courtesy of different vaccine manufacturers.

We found it was a distinct advantage to cluster the trainings and to organize training materials and resources and take the show on the road. Each ISI session was at capacity and we even had waiting lists. The MAs who attended gave very positive feedback. They said the curriculum was interactive and engaging, it enabled the experienced MAs to share with the less experienced, and they were very pleased to have

a course offered just for them!

Offering ISIs works really well for IPAC. We believe we make a positive impact on the community and provide a worthwhile competency-based training. What's more, our ISI training team is a real cross section of our coalition, all of whom attended a CDPH-facilitated train the trainer. There are IPAC members and staff from City of Berkeley, Alameda County, CHDP, Washington Hospital, and Asian Health Services.

The National Database for Autism Research Announces its First Data Release



Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) researchers now can use data from over 10,000 participants enrolled in ASD studies. The National Database for Autism Research (NDAR), created by the National Institutes of Health, recently made the data available. Researchers can now use the NDAR portal to perform queries that simultaneously yield results from multiple datasets. The portal was designed to provide tools to define and standardize data collected by different laboratories under different protocols. It was also built to ensure a collaborative approach and open data access to the whole ASD research community.

NDAR (<http://ndar.nih.gov>) was created through the joint efforts of National Institute of Mental Health, the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, and the NIH Center for Information Technology.

186 Immunization Coalitions Have Posted Information on www.izcoalitions.org--Is Yours One of Them?

Since its 2002 launch date, IAC's Immunization Coalitions website (www.izcoalitions.org) has posted information from 186 immunization coalitions. The site includes data from coalitions at all levels (local, state, regional, and national) and of all types, vaccine-specific as well as age-specific (childhood, adult, senior).



This online database allows health professionals, immunization advocates, parents, and others to contact specific coalitions to find resources, share ideas, and form strategic partnerships. Searches can be done by coalition name or geographic area.
