CDPH Flu Film and Poster Festival



It's BAAAAACKKK!! Once again, The California Department of Public (CDPH) has partnered with the California Immunization Coalition to sponsor the 2010 Flu Film & Poster Festival contest to promote awareness of flu prevention methods.

Our 2009 contest received more than 100 video entries. In addition to videos and English only-entries, the 2010 contest includes poster design categories and Spanish-only entries as well.

Awards will be given in four categories: 1) Video PSA: English, 2) Video PSA: Spanish, 3) Poster Design PSA: English and 4) Poster Design PSA: Spanish.

Entries for the 2010 contest will be accepted from September 15 - November 7, 2010. Each winner will receive a \$250 VISA gift card!

California residents age 14 and over can enter an original video Public Service Announcement or an original design poster that promotes at least one of these four messages:

1. Get vaccinated!
2. Stay home if you're sick!
3. Cover your cough or sneeze!
4. Wash your hands often!

Groups, such as schools, clubs, coalitions, or associations are also encouraged to enter. The public at-large will have an opportunity to vote on the final winners through the contest website.

Kids and Seasonal Flu Vaccine

The single best way to protect against seasonal flu and its potential severe complications in children is to make sure they are getting a seasonal influenza vaccine each year. All children 6 months through 8 years of age are recommended to receive 2 doses of 2010-11 flu vaccine unless they have received:



1. at least 1 dose of 2009 H1N1 vaccine last flu season, and
2. at least 1 dose of seasonal vaccine prior to the 2009-2010 flu season or 2 doses of seasonal flu vaccine last flu season

Most children 6 months through 8 years need 2 doses. These handy charts from the CDPH Immunization Branch can be extremely helpful for staff to use in checking how many doses are needed.

The second Virtual Immunization Communication Network webinar on July 22 featured Kristine M. Sheedy Ph.D, Associate Director for Communication Science at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention who presented ***The Flu Ends with U: Communication Strategies and Recommendations for the Upcoming Flu Season*** This



excellent presentation focused on the messages and communication strategies that will be used by the CDC during the upcoming influenza season and social media specialists, Holli Sietz of the CDC and Kerry Shearer of Sacramento discussed several ways to use social media and other easily accessible technologies to reach a broader audience and effectively convey these important health messages.

Fluzone High-Dose Vaccine



Fluzone High-Dose vaccine is a flu shot, made up of the 3 flu strains most likely to cause illness for a particular flu season. Fluzone High-Dose vaccines contain 4 times the amount of antigen (the part of the vaccine that prompts the body to make antibody) contained in regular flu shots. The additional antigen is intended to create a stronger immune response (more antibody) in the person getting the vaccine.

Human immune defenses become weaker with age, which places older people at greater risk of severe illness from influenza. Also, ageing decreases the body's ability to have a good immune response after getting influenza vaccine. A higher dose of antigen in the vaccine is supposed to give older people a better immune response and therefore better protection against flu.

Fluzone High-Dose is approved for use in people 65 years of age and older. As with all flu vaccines, Fluzone High-Dose is not recommended for people with a severe allergy to chicken eggs, or people who have had a severe reaction to a flu vaccine in the past.
