Mumps, Pertussis and Measles - What next?

As of Thursday, October 06, 2011 there have been at least 20 suspected and confirmed cases of **mumps** at the University of California Berkeley campus and additional cases are expected. Pertussis disease activity level continues to be high in California and it is at relatively increased levels throughout the State. At least 2,462 cases have been reported as of September 2011 and the California Immunization Coalition joins the California Department of Public Health in encouraging providers to be vigilant in vaccinating adolescents, new parents and grandparents to help reduce opportunities for disease transmission in the community and in particular to vulnerable infants too young to be fully protected by immunization.

In September, the CDPH reported 28 cases of **measles** which is the highest number seen since 2001, when 40 people in California were reported to have measles. These numbers are particularly concerning since a number of countries in Europe, Asia and Africa are currently seeing widespread outbreaks of the disease. 

during the season: influenza A (H1N1) virus, influenza A (H3N2) virus, and an influenza B virus. Although this season's vaccine contains the same three strains as last year's, experts recommend annual influenza vaccination for everyone 6 months and older.

The vaccine for this season is plentiful and there's no reason to wait to vaccinate.

With the shift to universal recommendations for influenza vaccination and the fact that this year's vaccine contains the same virus strains as last year, the community may continue to have questions, concerns and misconceptions about getting a flu shot. It is imperative that we as health professionals and health communicators be knowledgeable about current recommendations and resources.



Tdap Law Successful Due to Teamwork!

Congratulations and thanks to the many organizations and partners who helped implement this year's new school immunization law. While kindergartens are familiar with school immunization laws, the Tdap mandate was a new hurdle for many junior and senior high schools. In addition, the sheer number of students affected by the law--approximately 3 million--was enormous. Despite the apparent challenges, school nurses and administrators, private and public health professionals, local PTAs, chain pharmacies, and many other organizations worked closely together. The final numbers are not available yet because some schools are still collecting students' documentation, however, anecdotal reports suggest that the new immunization law roll-out was a resounding success!



We can't stop here, however. Pertussis continues to be widespread in California. If you're a provider, protect your unimmunized patients by giving them Tdap. If you're a parent, make sure you and your children are up-to-date with all immunizations. And remember next year, all 7th graders will need to provide proof of a pertussis vaccine booster. On August 23 the CIC Communications Committee hosted CA Local Coalition Leadership conference call. The goals of the call were to provide updates on local programs, activities and best practices, identify optimal mechanisms for disseminating immunization news, information and resources, and to discuss strategies for addressing local coalition's present and future challenges. Represented on the call were coalitions in Los Angeles, San Diego, Riverside, Orange County, San Francisco, Merced, Monterey, Contra Costa County, and Amador County, among others.



The discussion touched on the shared needs of the coalitions, including connecting with other IZ coordinators/coalitions, sharing resources (information, speakers, sharing best practices, community outreach, health disparities (e.g. reaching AA population), community communication strategies, funding challenges, and staffing. Two of the representatives on the call expressed interest in starting new coalitions in their areas.

The information shared was beneficial to all and the next conference call is scheduled for **November 29, 2011**. American Academy of Pediatrics Statement on HPV Vaccine



In response to erroneous statements made within and following a recent presidential campaign debate, the American Academy of Pediatrics issued the following statement:

"The American Academy of Pediatrics would like to correct false statements made in the (Sept 22, 2011) Republican presidential campaign that HPV vaccine is dangerous and can cause mental retardation. There is absolutely no scientific validity to this statement. Since the vaccine has been introduced, more than 35 million doses have been administered, and it has an excellent safety record.

"The American Academy of Pediatrics, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the American Academy of Family Physicians all recommend that girls receive HPV vaccine around age 11 or 12. That's because this is the age at which the vaccine produces the best immune response in the body, and because it's important to protect girls well before the onset of sexual activity. In the U.S., about 6 million people, including teens, become infected with HPV each year, and 4,000 women die from cervical cancer. This is a life-saving vaccine that can protect girls from cervical cancer."

Steps for a Successful School Year



State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson offers the

following back-to-school tips:

1. **Get your shots.** Seventh through twelve graders must get their pertussis shots, and must show proof of immunization to attend public and private schools this fall. For more information, please visit <http://www.cde.ca.gov/225509>.
2. **Get your sleep.** Doctors recommend children in the first through fifth grades get as much as 10 to 11 hours of sleep each night. Lack of sleep can affect a child's ability to learn and may affect their immune systems.
3. **Have a healthy breakfast.** Hungry children do not learn as well as well-nourished ones.
4. **Stay active.** Keep children physically active with bike rides, basketball, and walkathons.
5. **Avoid school absences.** Chronic absences are an early predictor of students dropping out of school that could affect their academic and career success.
6. **Read!** Reading to children calms them at bedtime and exposes them to language, sounds, new ideas, and the love of reading.
7. **Get to know your child's teacher.** This will help create a good line of communication to help avoid conflicts and misunderstandings about your child's education.
8. **Lend a hand.** Volunteer your time, raise money through booster clubs, and donate supplies to your local school.
9. **Drink plenty of water.** Many students have already started training for the high school sports season. With temperatures still in the 90s, everyone needs to watch out for heat exhaustion.
10. **Spend quality time with your kids.** This helps in your children's development and happiness, and helps reduce your own stress.

Central Valley Immunization Coalition



The Central Valley Immunization Coalition (CVIC) is a community partnership working to increase the immunization rates of children and adults in Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare Counties. It operates thanks to the many volunteers who make up its membership, and is independent of government funding. Board members are voted in, and elections are held every two years.

The Coalition was established in 1997 in Fresno to address the county's low pediatric immunization rates (48.9% for 2 year olds). In 1999 Madera County joined the effort and the name of the coalition changed to The Childhood Immunization Coalition of Fresno-Madera Counties. In 2010 Kings and Tulare County join the coalition and the name changed to reflect the four counties. The Central Valley Immunization Coalition mission has changed to protect the health of the people of the Central Valley by ensuring that every child and adult is fully immunized against vaccine preventable diseases.

CVIC promotes immunization observances, such as PVW, NIIW/TIM, and National Immunization Month in August. The Coalition also hosts special physician programs, and provides educational programs and seminars for providers and their staff.
